



## 2026 Building Trip Info Sheet for Cambodia

Thank you for your interest in visiting Cambodia with Volunteer Build to assist with building a home for the poor living in rural Siem Reap. No prior building experience is required to participate in this trip and well-behaved children over 10 years old travelling with a parent are welcome.

For many families in Siem Reap, life is a daily struggle. A house means more than shelter—it means security, health, and a foundation for brighter days. 🏡 Homes come equipped with toilets, clean water wells, water filters, and simple solar units, ensuring every family has the basic necessities to build a better future.

A typical trip programme is attached for your information. The trip starts in Phnom Penh which includes some orientation to give understanding to the more recent history of Cambodia under the Pol Pot regime. We will then head to Siem Reap where we will spend 4 days building a home. You will also have time to visit the 9<sup>th</sup> man made wonder of the world (Angkor Wat) in Siem Reap.

The trip finishes on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> of August 2026, however team members have the option to join others in Vietnam for some R & R and tourism activities (additional cost from \$1,350 pp).

### Flights & Trip Budget:

Best available fares from Auckland to Phnom Penh and from Siem Reap to Auckland start at around \$1800 return on various airlines, plus allow from \$160-\$200 to fly from Phnom Penh to Siem Reap. We can assist you with making these bookings. You have the option to join us after the build trip officially finishes for an optional week of R & R in Vietnam (more info below) or fly back to NZ on the 21<sup>st</sup> of August 2026, or continue with your own plans.

Costs are based on an exchange rate of US0.60 to NZ\$1. Pricing is subject to change with movements in currency and supplier price changes.

### Accommodation:

Share twin with same gender or your spouse/child in 3/4-star hotels.

While correct at date of publication, Volunteer Build reserves the right to vary trip programs and pricing at any time.



Transport: Hire vans with local drivers, planes, tuk tuks, boat (river cruise)

Building Contribution: The building materials for the house, a water well, and toilet cost US\$4,000. Each person will contribute NZ\$1,000 to the building fund on current exchange rate. A receipt will be provided which may qualify for up to a 33% (\$333) donation credit on your NZ tax.

Vaccinations: You will need to consult your doctor, however common vaccinations required are Tetanus, Diphtheria, MMR, Hepatitis A & B, Japanese encephalitis, typhoid, flu vaccination. Remember it's not just you who needs protection – it's the Cambodian kids and families you interact with as well. You will also need to take anti-malarial medicine. All team members must be vaccinated to travel on this tour and provide confirmation to us prior to departure. More information will be provided in the full pre-trip briefing.

Visas: A passport and visa are required. Tourists may purchase a Cambodian e visa for approx. US\$36 valid for 30 days. You will need an electronic passport-sized photograph.

Travel insurance is compulsory and must include coverage for manual labor/building. Volunteer Build offers a Covermore policy. Once your application has been accepted, we will email you a quote.

\*What is covered in the Trip Cost?

**Volunteer Build:** \$1650 - covers accommodation in Cambodia on our core trip dates, van transport & driver, daily breakfast; drinking water and snacks on build site, dedicated trip guide, entrance to Killing Fields Museum, Tuol Sleng Security Prison.

***What is not covered in the Trip Cost?***

- 4. The families chosen represent the very poorest in their communities as well as being role models** for their courage and faith in their own ability to overcome seemingly insurmountable odds.
